Family church worship plan 2026. 1. 25

4th Week of January: Let us be a church that God causes to triumph wherever we go(2 Samuel 8:1~6).

Welcome

What are you interested in lately? Please share how God touched your heart through Grace Time last week? Also, let's share one of the gracious things we received through last week's Grace Time.

Text: 2 Samuel 8:1~6

Introduction

David, like Caleb, was a man who moved forward in faith, holding firmly to the vision God had given him and trusting in His promises. Scripture repeatedly declares this about David in verses 6 and 14:

(verses 6 & 14) **“The LORD gave David victory wherever he went.”**

In 2 Samuel, a total of six victories of David are recorded. These enemies were not easy opponents. They were great in number, strong in weaponry, and highly experienced. Yet David won every battle. David's overwhelming victories were not because he was exceptionally capable, nor because his enemies were weak, but because God granted him victory.

What, then, was the secret behind David's victories? What was the source of his prosperity and success? The Bible tells us that David was blessed because he loved God in an extraordinary way.

(Romans 8:28) **“And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him.”**

As the new year begins, we pray for prosperity and success. We hope that nothing will hinder us. But the real question is this: What produces true prosperity? The answer is clear—love God. David loved God, and his love was not merely expressed in words, but in his life, his attitude, and his choices. That love was revealed through the following three devotions

Observation Question: What were the three devotions that expressed David's love for God?

Answer 1. Devotion to Worship: Filling oneself with God's love and presence.

Be Filled (Mareh in Hebrew)!

After David became king, the very first thing he did was to bring back the Ark of the

Covenant. To Israel, the Ark symbolized God Himself—His presence, His rule, and His dwelling among His people. Saul showed no interest in where the Ark was. But when David found the neglected Ark and brought it into Jerusalem, he laid aside his royal dignity and rejoiced, dancing before the LORD. David placed the Ark beside the royal palace, appointed choirs, and had God worshiped with psalms he himself had written. David offered wholehearted worship before God.

The reason David was able to worship with such fullness was because his life was centered on worship. Fullness does not come from achievements, but from an inner life filled with God. Therefore, David confesses:

(Psalm 27:4) “One thing I have asked of the LORD, that I will seek: that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the LORD and to seek Him in His temple.”

[Baek Sa-gyeom, a renowned blind evangelist of the early Korean church]

Though blind, he memorized so much of the Bible that he was nicknamed “the walking Gospel.” After coming to faith in Jesus, he held family worship every single day for 40 years of his life—never missing a day except for the two days he was hospitalized. He lived a life in which fullness had become second nature.

Application Question 1

- 1) How do you prepare for worship in order to fully encounter God? Offerings, time allotment, and heart (a longing and expectant heart, humility, repentance, etc.), and through holiness in daily life.
- 2) During worship, how can we seek and long for God's presence rather than focusing on the eyes of other people?

Answer 2. Obey God's Word (Verse 12)

Subdue (Kabash in Hebrew)!

When the war broke out with the Philistines, their commander Goliath mocked God, yet the Israelites trembled in fear before him. Then David appeared. He did not focus on the situation. There was only one thing he saw: “The name of God is being trampled.”

(1 Samuel 17:26) “David said to the men standing near him, ‘What will be done for the man who kills this Philistine and removes this disgrace from Israel? Who is this uncircumcised Philistine that he should defy the armies of the living God?’”

David could not tolerate the name of God being dishonored. He did not go out to fight with weapons, but in the name of the LORD.

(1 Samuel 17:45) “David said to the Philistine, ‘You come against me with sword and spear and javelin, but I come against you in the name of the LORD Almighty, the God of the armies of Israel, whom you have defied.’”

This is the spirit of “Kabash (Subdue).” Kabash means to bring whatever resists God's rule into submission. It is to tear down systems and orders that dishonor the name of God.

Eric Liddell, the real-life model for the film Chariots of Fire, is an example of “David's zeal.” At the

1924 Paris Olympics, he was Britain's leading gold medal contender in the 100 meters. However, he learned that his main event would be held on a Sunday. Because of his firm conviction that “Sunday is the Lord's Day,” he chose to honor God's name above winning a gold medal and withdrew from the race. Later, he competed in the 400 meters, which was held on a weekday, and won the gold medal. Afterward, he set aside all honor and devoted his life as a missionary in China, living to exalt the name of God until the end of his life.

Application Question 2

- 1) The obstacles you are currently battling in your life - such as emotional struggles, relationship conflicts, or competition - are they centered on God or yourself? What are the spiritual battle grounds of your life are called to fight for God's glory and to honor His name?

Answer 3. Devotion to God's Word: Governing Oneself with God's Words.

Rule (Radah in Hebrew)!

To rule means to govern oneself by the Word of God. Although David was a king, he did not live according to his own will or rule by his emotions. Because he placed God's Word above his royal authority, he was called “a man after God's own heart.”

(Acts 13:22) “...I have found David son of Jesse, a man after My own heart; he will do everything I want him to do.”

For this reason, God later used David as the standard by which all kings were evaluated.

(2 Kings 22:2) “Josiah did what was right in the eyes of the LORD and walked in all the ways of his father David, not turning aside to the right or to the left.”

David had the opportunity to kill Saul, but because Saul was “the LORD's anointed,” he chose not to kill him, judging the situation according to God's Word. A person who governs himself by the God's word will inevitably reveal it in his life—most clearly through love for others.

(1 John 4:12) “No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and His love is made complete in us.”

Therefore, Scripture repeatedly warns us:

(1 John 2:15) “Do not love the world or anything in the world. If anyone loves the world, love for the Father is not in them.”

When we love the world, God's Word within us becomes blurred. When the Word becomes blurred, emotions rise up. When emotions begin to rule, life starts to collapse. Only those who govern themselves by God's Word can keep their lives from falling apart.
